## **5 Year Analysis of Hispanic Trends**

Research Brief #30

Fall 2016

The Hispanic population is one of the fastest growing populations in the United States. This research brief reports the Hispanic enrollment of Southeastern undergraduate students from Fall 2011 to Fall 2015. So far, the largest undergraduate Hispanic population occurred in 2015 (n=939). These students represented 7% of the undergraduate population. Colleges with the steadiest increases are:


- Arts, Humanities & Social Sciences

• The College of Arts, Humanities & Socials Sciences continues to grow steadily in Hispanic students. In the Fall of 2012, the college had its largest increase from Fall 2011 (30% (n=54)). The college increased its Hispanic population by 49.8% (n=128) over the past 5 years.

• The College of Business increased its Hispanic students by 45.6% (n=68) over the past 5 years. The largest increase came in the Fall of 2014 (13% (n=15)) after a significant drop in enrollment the previous year.

• The College of Education increased its Hispanic students by 29% (n=18) over the past 5 years. There was a 38% (n=28) increase in Fall 2012 from Fall 2011.

• The College of Nursing & Health Sciences increased its Hispanic students by 58.5% (n=131) over the past 5 years. The largest increase was in Fall 2012(39.0% (n=60)) from the previous year.

• The College of Science & Technology increased its Hispanic students by 49.0% (n=77) over the past 5 years. Its largest increase occurred in Fall 2012 from the previous year (29.0% (n=33)).

• The Center for Student Excellence houses students who have not declared a major. The center increased its Hispanic students by 6.7% (n=6) over the past 5 years.
