


# Semester Registration Report Fall 2001

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## **Longitudinal Enrollment**

Southeastern's total student enrollment decreased by 0.09% from the Fall 2000 semester to the Fall 2001 semester. This reflects a 0.8% decrease in undergraduate enrollment and a 5.3% increase in graduate enrollment. Graduate enrollment includes students in Alternate Certification Programs.

# Full-time Equivalent (FTE) Students Taught

The number of full-time equivalent (FTE) students taught decreased 0.2% from the Fall 2000 semester to the Fall 2001 semester. (Note: These FTE calculations are based on the undergraduate and graduate hours taught by departments. These calculations will differ from FTE calculations based on the student classification of undergraduate and graduate.) The number of full-time equivalent undergraduate students equals the total undergraduate student credit hour (SCH) production divided by 12, and the number of full-time equivalent graduate equals the total graduate SCH production divided by 9.

#### **Average Course Loads**

The average course load of undergraduate students is 13.4 hours which is the same as Fall 2000. The average course load for graduate students (including Alternate Certification students, Master's plus 30, and Extended Studies students) is 6.2 hours, which is an increase from 6.1 in Fall 2000. In Fall, a full-time undergraduate student is enrolled in 12 or more hours and full-time graduate students in 9 or more hours. Part-time undergraduate students are enrolled in less than 12 hours and graduate students in less than 9 hours.


