


Semester Registration Report Spring 2001

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Longitudinal Enrollment

Southeastern's total student enrollment decreased by 3.2% from the Spring 2000 semester to the Spring 2001 semester. This reflects a 3.3% decrease in undergraduate enrollment and a 2.0% decrease in graduate enrollment. Graduate enrollment includes students in Alternate Certification Programs.

First-time Freshman ACT Scores

The average ACT Composite score for first-time freshmen increased from 17.8 in spring 2000 to 18.9 in Spring 2001; the average ACT English score increased from 17.3 to 18.9; the average ACT math score increased from 16.4 to 17.4.

Full-time Equivalent (FTE) Students Taught

The number of full-time equivalent (FTE) students taught decreased 2.4% from the Spring 2000 semester to the Spring 2001 semester. (Note: These FTE calculations are based on the undergraduate and graduate hours taught by departments. These calculations will differ from FTE calculations based on the student classification of undergraduate and graduate.) The number of full-time equivalent undergraduate students equals the total undergraduate student credit hour (SCH) production divided by 12, and the number of full-time equivalent graduate equals the total graduate SCH production divided by 9.

Average Course Loads

The average course load of undergraduate students is 13.4 hours which is the same as Spring 2000. The average course load for graduate students (including Alternate Certification students, Master's plus 30, and Extended Studies students) is 6.1 hours, which is an increase from 5.9 in Spring 2000. In Spring, a full-time undergraduate student is enrolled in 12 or more hours and full-time graduate students in 9 or more hours. Part-time undergraduate students are enrolled in less than 12 hours and graduate students in less than 9 hours.

Top Six Parishes

The six parishes which most of Southeastern's Louisiana resident students claim as a home parish are the parishes listed in the table below. With 3,700 students, Tangipahoa is the most represented parish. Tangipahoa Parish had the largest increase in undergraduate enrollment with 20%, an increase of 544 students. Livingston Parish had the largest percent increase in graduate students with an increase of 25 students or 16%.



The number of female students enrolled at Southeastern decreased by 2.0% from Spring 2000 to Spring 2001; male students decreased 5.3%. There were a total of 9,373 female students enrolled and 4,805 male students enrolled.
