

Psyc 101 General Psychology I

Southeastern Louisiana University Dual Enrollment 2023-2024 Academic Year

Southeastern's PSYC 101 Dual Enrollment course is a hybrid course with all content delivered online through Moodle by Southeastern faculty. The high school teacher will serve as the course facilitator by offering supplemental instruction. Psyc 101DE meets the same standards in content and rigor as Psyc 101 courses offered on Southeastern's campus. Students must have adequate access to technology resources to complete this course. Psyc 101 Dual Enrollment course may be facilitated in a year-long format or in a semester-long format.

Course Description: Credit 3 hours. A survey of the science of mind and behavior of humans and other animal. Topics may include the scientific method, history of psychology, learning, development, personality, social psychology, and psychopathology.

Student Learning Outcomes: After completing this course, students will be able to:

- Explain why psychology is a science with the primary objectives of describing, understanding, predicting, and controlling behavior and mental processes.
- Recognize and recall psychological concepts and theories from key subfields (e.g., development, learning, personality, social, and abnormal) and the contributions of key figures in psychology.
- Compare and contrast the major theoretical perspectives in psychology.
- Describe research methods used by psychologists including their respective advantages and disadvantages.
- Apply examples of relevant and practical applications of psychological principles to everyday life.

Course facilitators are required to use the software that supports the textbook. The course software is included with the course and provides e-textbooks.

Exams: There will be four 100-point exams and a 120-point final exam. The first four exams will cover material from each unit of the course. The final exam is comprehensive and will cover the entire course. Exams will be administered via MoodleDE and grades will be posted on MoodleDE. There will be 520 total points from exams.

Quizzes: There will be eight 15-point quizzes that cover each unit of the course. Each student will be allowed three attempts for each quiz and the highest grade submitted prior to the deadline will be used. Quizzes are available via MoodleDE. There are 120 points in Quizzes.

Grade scale: [90-100% = A] [80-89% = B] [70-79% = C] [60-69% = D] [<60% = F] Grades will be posted on MoodleDE at the completion of the unit. The Instructor of record will report final grades in LeoNet.

Note: Dual enrollment students will receive a grade for their Psyc 101 course work and they will receive a grade for their high school Psychology course work. These grades may be different.

Make-ups: Each high school will provide their make-up policy.

Academic Dishonesty: Schools agree that the first incident of academic dishonesty in any course by any student in any manner will result in a grade of 0 on the assessment in question. The second incident will result in the student's failing the Southeastern portion of the course. Southeastern's Academic Dishonesty Policy:

Students are expected to maintain the highest standards of academic integrity. Behavior that violates these standards is not acceptable. Examples are the use of unauthorized material, communication with fellow students during an examination, attempting to benefit from the work of another student and similar behavior that defeats the intent of an examination or other class work. Withdrawal Policy: Students will not be automatically withdrawn for non-attendance or non-participation. Students wishing to withdraw from a dual enrollments course are responsible for completing withdrawal forms and filing them with the high school course coordinator before the deadline. The withdrawal deadline for the course is based on format (yearlong or semester long). The withdrawal date is October 27, 2023 for Fall courses and March 28, 2024 for Spring and yearlong courses.

Transferability: It is incumbent upon all students and parents to determine the transferability of Dual Enrollment courses to other institutions. For in-state institutions, Southeastern courses can be cross-referenced using the Statewide Articulation Matrix to determine transferability (https://regents.la.gov/master-course-articulation). Out-of-state institutions should be consulted to determine transferability.

FERPA Guidelines: Dual enrollment students are enrolled in a college course at Southeastern, with the same rights and responsibilities as any other Southeastern student. This includes the privacy protections afforded by the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act. Students are free to share their progress in the course with their parents, if they so choose. However, course instructors cannot speak with parents about student progress in the course without the student first waiving their FERPA rights. Grade Appeals: Should a student have a concern about a final grade posted for a dual enrollment course, the Grade Appeals policy should be followed below. Please note that a student has 30 days to make a written appeal to the Southeastern Instructor of Record:

After a final course grade is recorded in the Records and Registration Office, a change of grade must be approved in sequence by the instructor of record, the instructor's department head, and the academic dean of the College of College of Arts, Humanities, and Social Sciences. In the event of a contested final course grade, a student's written appeal of the grade must be submitted to the instructor within **thirty (30)** calendar days of final grades for the term being due.
