Re: Goal Attainment Framework for 1998-1999

Attached is the Goal Attainment Framework (GAF) for the Department of Accounting for the Academic Year of 1998-1999. This information was initially compiled during the fall semester of 1999. It was initially due in your office as of 12-1-99. I thought that I sent this information to you quite some time ago. However, while updating my assessment-related records recently, I discovered that I cannot find a memo where the information was actually sent to you. Therefore, I am sending it to you on the off chance that I did not send it as initially intended.

The results are based on the Alumni Survey conducted in 1997 which surveyed alumni that graduated during the 1994-1995 and 1995-1996 academic years. This Alumni Survey was published in September, 1999. The results are also based on additional information provided by your office regarding grades earned by accounting majors in Communications 211, English 101, and English 102 during the Fall semester of 1998, the Spring semester of 1999, and the Summer semester of 1999.

The GAF is based on the Major Field Assessment Plan (MFA Plan) adopted by the Department of Accounting during the fall semester of 1998. Because the MFA Plan was not adopted until the Fall of 1998 and certain additional questions, needed to measure the expected outcomes in that MFA plan, were not added to the Exit Survey until the summer of 1999, the assessment measurements based on the Exit Survey could not be completed. In addition, assessment measurements based on a Student Internship Questionnaire to be given to the employers of student interns could not be completed for a similar reason (i.e., the Student Internship Questionnaire was not developed in time for this report).

As you can see from the GAF, areas where results were less than expected included the following:
1) opinion of accounting graduates regarding the degree to which their written communication skills were improved, 2) the number of accounting majors making a "C" or better in Communications 211, 3) the number of accounting majors making a "C" or better in English 101 and 102, 4) opinion of accounting graduates regarding the degree to which (both relative and absolute) their undergraduate education at Southeastern prepared them for graduate/professional school.

The questions regarding graduate/professional school had a total of six responses. The other questions had a total of twenty-nine responses. As a result of this limited amount of data, and given the missing information from the Exit Survey and Student Internship Questionnaire, the Assessment Committee and the faculty decided that the available data on which the GAF is based was insufficient to make any recommendations for change. The decision was made to monitor the situation as additional data is collected and analyzed.
