



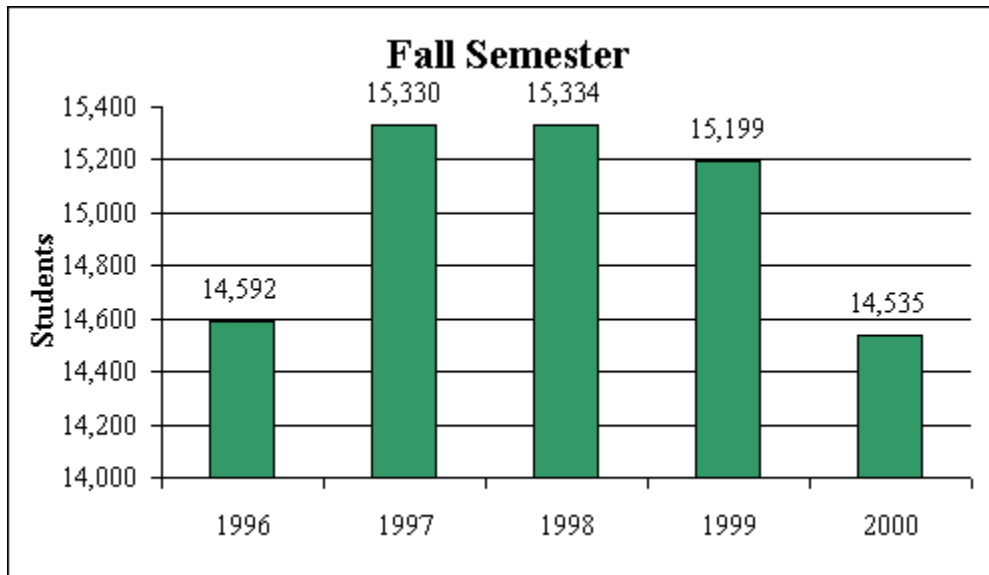
Semester Registration Report Fall 2000

The Fall of 2000 saw several exciting changes occur at Southeastern. For the first time, Southeastern implemented screened admissions standards. Beginning freshmen had to score either a 20 on the ACT, have a 2.0 GPA in a core set of high school courses, or be in the upper 50% of the high school graduating class. Also, an academic reorganization took place. A new department was created, some departments moved to different colleges, and some departments were reorganized.

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Longitudinal Enrollment

Southeastern's total student enrollment decreased by 4.4% from the Fall 1999 semester to the Fall 2000 semester. This reflects a 4.1% decrease in undergraduate enrollment and a 5.8% decrease in graduate enrollment. Graduate enrollment includes students in Alternate Certification Programs.

First-time Freshman ACT Scores

The average ACT Composite score for first-time freshmen increased from 19.0 in Fall 1999 to 19.8 in Fall 2000; the average ACT English score increased from 18.9 to 20.0; the average ACT math score increased from 17.8 to 18.5.

Full-time Equivalent (FTE) Students Taught

The number of full-time equivalent (FTE) students taught decreased 4.2% from the Fall 1999 semester to the Fall 2000 semester. (Note: These FTE calculations are based on the undergraduate and graduate hours taught by departments. These calculations will differ from FTE calculations based on the student classification of undergraduate and graduate.) The number of full-time equivalent undergraduate students equals the total undergraduate student credit hour (SCH) production divided by 12, and the number of full-time equivalent graduate equals the total graduate SCH production divided by 9.

Number of Full-time and Part-time Students

The average course load of undergraduate students is 13.4 hours which is a slight decrease from 13.5 in Fall 1999. The average course load for graduate students (including Alternate Certification students, Master's plus 30, and Extended Studies students) is 6.1 hours, which is an increase from 5.6 in Fall 1999. In Fall, a full-time undergraduate student is enrolled in 12 or more hours and full-time graduate students in 9 or more hours. Part-time undergraduate students are enrolled in less than 12 hours and graduate students in less than 9 hours.

Top Six Parishes

Washington Parish had the largest percent increase in graduate students with an increase of 10 students or 10.8%.

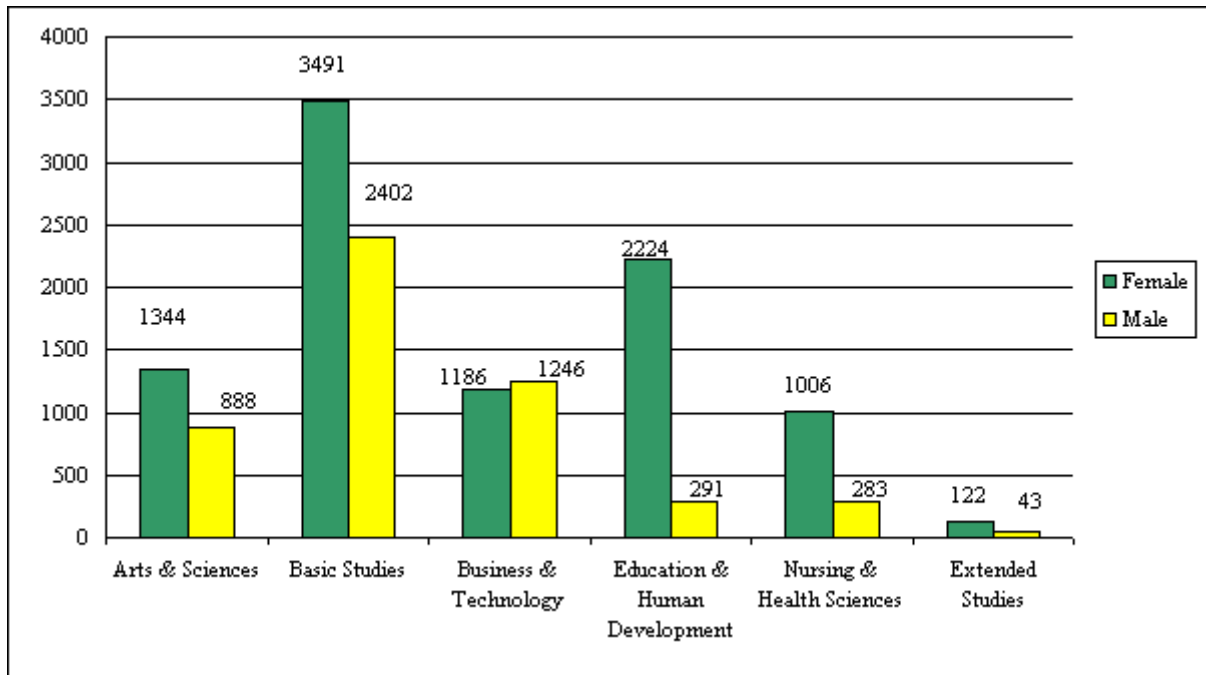

Enrollment by Gender
