When asked what benefits they received from hands-on experience, respondents had the following to say:

- exposure to real world work environment

- Increased appreciation of research to the point that it is a part of my current position
- It would be extremely difficult to obtain a degree in a nursing field without clinical practicum.
- Learned everything from clinicals
- Preparation for life after graduation
- Networking, opportunities for jobs and potential career growth
- Learned a lot
- It help me to be prepared for real world experience.
- Much of my degree required clinical experience. I loved being out in the feild. I feel as though this was an in-valuable experience.
- It gave me an opportunity to experience teaching alongside seasoned faculty members before I was an actual teacher myself. It allowed me to see different styles of teaching so that I could choose my own style.
- Perfecting clinical nursing skills

Graduate Professional Education

One (4.5%) of the respondents has completed a doctoral degree program, nine (40.9%) plan to enroll in a doctoral program in the future, and eleven (50.0%) have no plans for further education.

Employment

Two (9.1%) of the respondents have not been employed full-time since graduating from Southeastern, while nineteen (86.4%) have been employed full-time. Of those who have been employed full-time, nine (47.4%) had a job before graduating, four (21.1%) accepted a position upon graduation, and five (26.3%) took 1-6 months to find a job.

The five respondents who did not have a job upon graduation faced a variety of problems in obtaining employment. Table 2 presents what were considered major problems, minor problems, or no problem.

Eleven (57.9%) of those who have been employed full-time indicated their education was "Very Effective" in preparing them for employment or improving their job performance, six (31.6%) indicated it was "Effective", and one (5.3%) indicated it was "Very Ineffective". In regards to sources for learning about their first full-time job, one (5.3%) indicated faculty at Southeastern, one (5.3%) from a newspaper/trade publication, one (5.3%) from a professional organization, four (21.1%) from another student/friend, five (26.3%) already had the job, two (10.5%) from an internship or practicum, and one (5.3%) from an employment agency.

Fifteen (68.2%) are currently employed full-time, four (18.2%) are employed part-time and satisfied with part-time employment, and one (4.5%) is unemployed and not looking for

employment. Of those who are currently employed full-time, fourteen (93.3%) are employed in the state of Louisiana. Three (20.0%) are employed in higher education, one (6.7%) in government, eight (53.3%) in health agencies, and two (13.3%) are self-employed. When asked "If underemployment is defined as a condition in which your job requires lower levels of skill and training than those you acquired in college would you say that you are currently underemployed", none (0.0%) of the respondents indicated they are underemployed. Eleven (73.3%) of the respondents are well satisfied with their employment and would not consider leaving and three (20.0%) are satisfied with their employment, but would consider other employment. Thirteen (86.7%) of the respondents are employed in an the area of their Southeastern major or a related area. Fourteen (93.3%) respondent indicated a salary over \$50.000.

Professional Activities

Sixteen (72.7%) of the respondents indicated they currently hold a license, and three (13.6%) indicated it is not available in their field. Seventeen (77.3%) of the respondents are members of a professional organization, and ten (45.5%) have attended a professional meeting in the past year.
