START functions as a communications and information-sharing network that assesses and responds to students in crisis in or out of the classroom. Additionally, the team meets regularly to discuss and plan appropriate responses to potential student psychological/mental health and behavioral issues.

WHERE TO START?

The Office of the Dean of Students

In the event you are hospitalized, there will likely be a lot on your mind and you may not be able to notify your professors about your absence from campus. [The office of the Dean of Students](#) is available to be of support, offer care, and to notify others here on campus. You may contact the office of the Dean of Students at 985-549-3792

The Office for Student Advocacy and Accountability (OSAA)

Confirm the date and time by responding to the email sent by OSAA to your Southeastern Email Account for a wellness consultation meeting to provide resources for your return to campus. *not required prior to resuming your attendance in class.

IF YOU LIVE IN THE RESIDENCE HALL

Once you are discharged, you will want to let your **Resident Assistant (RA)** or your **Area Coordinator (AC)** know you are safely back in the hall (if you need the contact information of any of your Residence Hall Staff, it can be [found here](#).)

RETURNING TO CAMPUS FAQs

What if I need additional medical care after my hospitalization?

While some follow-up steps may require a specific doctor or specialist, the **University Health Center** offers a variety of healthcare services such as primary care, as well as some specialized care, and may be able to offer some of the health services you require. What if I need mental or emotional support, care, or counseling after my hospitalization?

What if I need accommodations because of a lasting part of my medical condition?

If your hospitalization significantly impacts your day-to-day functioning upon your return to campus, then **Student Accessibility Services (SAS)** may be able to assist. SAS facilitates the process of academic accommodations for students with disabilities and works in collaboration with other University departments in an attempt to ensure full participation in all activities, programs, and services of the University.
